Crop rotation is an important practice in a vegetable garden to reduce plant disease and insect problems along with improving soil fertility. Vegetables that belong to the same family are susceptible to the same types of insects and plant diseases along with having similar nutrient requirements. Crop rotation involves each year changing the planting location of vegetables that belong to the same family. For example you would not want to plant tomatoes in the same location as last year but also do not want to plant peppers, eggplants, and potatoes in the same location since they are all in the same vegetable family. Below are the main vegetable families:

* *Composite Family:* Endive, Lettuce, Sunflower

* *Goosefoot Family:* Beet, Spinach, Swiss Chard

* *Gourd Family:* Cantaloupe, Cucumber, Pumpkin, Squash, Watermelon

* *Grass Family:* Ornamental corn, Sweet Corn

* *Lily Family:* Chives, Garlic, Onion

* *Mallow Family:* Okra

* *Mustard Family:* Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Collard, Kale, Mustard greens, Radish, Rutabaga, Turnip

* *Nightshade Family:* Eggplant, Pepper, Potato, Tomato

* *Parsley Family:* Carrot, Celery, Parsley

* *Pea Family:* Bush bean, Lima bean, Pea, Pole bean
