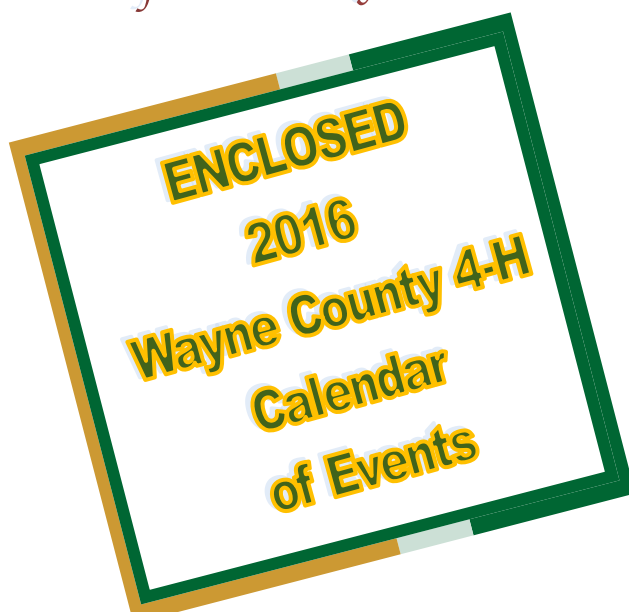
National Poultry Conference
